Which makes me wonder why it's so important to create this humanoid robot shape? Watch out for this Quit Claim scam that can literally steal your house!

Most of us will never experience a housing scam. But it's my job to get the word out just in case your circumstances make you a target for scammers. In this case, the scam is **quit claim deeding**. This scam usually occurs with vacant homes—even temporarily vacant, such as homes whose owners are on an extended holiday, rentals that are

between tenants, homes under construction, vacation or second homes, homes for sale, and homes that are awaiting family actions after the death of an owner.

A quitclaim deed is a legal document used to quickly transfer ownership of a property from one person to another without a sale — for example, when a parent gives a home to their adult child. These deeds require minimal documentation, which makes them appealing to scammer who forge signatures and file the deeds, effectively stealing the home by transferring ownership without consent. This tactic allows the scammer to secure loans or even sell to unsuspecting buyers. Unfortunately, there are few restrictions in place to block such transfers, and if you don't notice it's happened, it can take years to unwind the problems.

To protect yourself stay vigilant. Find out if your property's local registration office has a fraud alert system that will text or email you when a change is made to your deed. If you get such an alert, contact the office immediately. Also, it's a good idea to place cameras around your property, even if it's under construction.

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Can I paint my side of a fence that's on my neighbor's property?

When a fence sits directly on the property line, both neighbors are free to paint their side of the fence. However, if the fence was built all or part on your neighbor's property, you're in a tricky spot. In most cases, a fence on your neighbor's property requires their permission to paint, even if they never see the side that you see. Check with local laws to be certain, but usually, painting any part of the fence on your neighbor's property without their permission can be considered encroachment or an unauthorized use of their property.

Open communication with your neighbor is the key. Go into the conversation being aware that what seems perfectly reasonable to you might not to them. Be prepared to explain that you'll pay for the painting, and it will help the fence last longer. But also, be prepared for them to simply say no. In that case, you can put up a separate fence on your side or use some other form of sight-line blockage, like a lattice wall or hedge.

Even if the fence between your houses is entirely on your property and you don't need to ask their permission, consider that your neighbor must look at their side of your fence. While they could put up their own fence, it would be more neighborly if you could communicate with them and perhaps get them to help pay for painting their side.

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
