

How long does it take to walk 10,000 steps?

Most people have heard that walking 10,000 steps per day is beneficial for health, but where did that number come from? The original recommendation was not based on any studies but was part of a Japanese advertising campaign from 1965 designed to sell pedometers.

Since then, several studies have aimed to prove whether 10,000 steps (approximately 4 to 5 miles) is the ideal goal for health and fitness. Overall results have been mixed, demonstrating no one-size-fits-all recommendation, and each person's needs are unique.

Certainly, walking some large number of steps, such as 6,000 to 10,000, has been proven beneficial overall. But instead of blindly striving for 10,000 steps, consider your own pace, age, health, and available time.

Find a maximum number of steps that works for you. Strive for 5,000 and then see if you can do 6,000. Then more if you can and have time. **Consider that walking 10,000 steps takes an average of 1 hour and 40 minutes.**

5 mostly archaic household chores that were common in the 1800s

- **Ironing using live coals.** Most irons before electricity contained a chamber for live coals to heat a flat metal plate. That's also how bed warmers worked.
- Churning butter by hand. Before you could run down to the local grocer, you had to make your own butter. All you needed was a cow or access to milk, plus a butter churn, which is basically a paddle inside a chamber that you can use to agitate the milk for a long time until it thickens into both butter and buttermilk.
- **Darning socks.** Darning refers to a running stitch in which the thread is woven in rows along the grain of the fabric, reversing direction at the end of each row, a technique for filling in holes in knitted fabric, like socks.
- Making soap using lye and fats. The lye was caustic and very effective for cleaning, although it could also cause chemical burns.
- Whitewashing walls with a mixture of lime, salt, and water. The white coating sealed the outside of walls against mold, pests, and the elements, while also leaving them a gleaming white that reflected sunlight. Whitewash was cheap and easily made in some locations, unlike pigmented paint.





A word about mortgages

The word mortgage comes from Old French *morgage*, meaning "death pledge," from mort (dead) and gage (pledge), because the deal dies when the debt is paid, or payment fails. In 1664, Sir Edward Coke wrote: "And it seemeth, that the cause why it is called mortgage is, for that it is doubtful whether the feoffor will pay at the day limited such sum or not: and if he doth not pay, then the land which is put in pledge upon condition for the payment of the money, is taken from him forever, and so dead to him upon condition. And if he doth pay the money, then the pledge is dead as to the tenant."

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Scary reasons to buy Title Insurance at closing

When you buy a house; you expect to buy it with clear title, with nobody coming after you later to say you owe them money for the house, or that your fence is built halfway onto their property, or that the person who sold it wasn't qualified to sell it. But these kinds of things do happen, all the time!

Imagine owning a house for a few years when someone claims they are an heir to the person who sold you the house, and they never gave permission to sell. Or imagine the seller did a lot of remodeling before selling (which is why you bought it), but he didn't pay his contractor, and the contractor placed a lien against the house and now is coming after you for the unpaid debt. Or imagine that you go to sell your house sometime in the future and discover that the deed incorrectly lists the house across the street (which means in some twisted way that you own that house, not yours). Or imagine someone claiming that they're the owners of your house because the seller sold it twice (fraud).

Title insurance makes it possible to recover financial loss in these situations. Chances are that nothing like this will happen to you, but it pays to play it safe and get the title insurance. After all, insurance is something we buy and hope we never need. I'll remind you of these details at closing, when you'll have a lot of decisions to make!

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
